The first summer law program in China's historic capital, offering up to six hours of ABA-approved credit.

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I. GENERAL INFORMATION

- Duquesne University-CUPL Relationship:** The summer program is sponsored by the Duquesne University School of Law (the Duquesne Law School). The academic curriculum and program are administered by the Duquesne Law School. The director is Professor Alfred S. Peláez and the Associate Director is Professor Frank Y. Liu of Duquesne University. The China University of Political Science and Law (CUPL) assists the Duquesne Law School in providing facilities and administrative support, making local arrangements for program activities, and recruiting prominent local Chinese faculty members.
- Credit Hours or Grade:** The program features a comprehensive survey of the Chinese legal system, covering all major facets of Chinese law. Students completing the program will receive four and one-half (4-1/2) hours of ABA-approved credit. Students completing the optional Chinese Language and Culture class (May 27-28) will be awarded an additional half (1/2) credit at no extra cost. Two internships with prestigious Chinese law firms are available to Chinese-speaking students on a first-come first-served basis. A number of positions with the clinical programs of CUPL in the areas of intellectual property and labor law are also available. Students successfully completing internships will be awarded an extra one-half (1/2) credit per week for a maximum of three weeks. Students successfully completing the two-week clinical program will be awarded an extra one (1) credit. **Internships are held following the completion of the three-week course program. Clinicals will begin one week before the start of the program and the afternoons of the first week of the program. However, it is important for you to know that acceptance of any credit or grade earned in the Program, including internship, is subject to the discretion of your own law school. Therefore, we would urge you to check with your dean on this matter as soon as possible.**

Further, it is unlikely that participation in this program may be used to accelerate graduation; students interested in acceleration should consult their home schools to review this issue.
- Performance Requirement and Grading Methods:** An examination will be administered and graded at the end of the Program. The Duquesne Law School grading system stated below shall be used for grading the examination paper.

The minimum passing grade is C. A letter grade is awarded only for the classroom portion of the program. The internship and clinical portions of the program are graded "Pass" or Fail."

4. **The Class Schedule:** A copy of the lecture topics and schedule is attached for your reference. Duquesne University Law School reserves the right to change both the schedule and topics due to the unavailability of scheduled lecturers.
5. **Course Materials:** The course materials will be prepared by Duquesne University Law School and CUPL faculty members who will be teaching in the program. These materials include primary source documents and law review articles. Each student will receive a set of these course materials without charge prior to departure for Beijing.
6. **Access for Individuals with Disabilities:** Every effort shall be made to ensure that individuals with disabilities shall have equal access to all facilities of the program. Please let us know immediately of any special needs you may require.
7. **Passport/Visa:** For you to obtain a visa to enter the People's Republic of China (PRC), you must have a passport valid for a minimum of six months beyond the date you enter the PRC. If you do not have a passport valid until December 1, 2011, you should apply for a new passport immediately.

A visa is required for entry into the PRC. The Duquesne University Law School will provide proper instructions for all enrolled students to apply for a visa from one of several PRC Consulate General offices in the U.S.

8. **Check-in and Check-out Time:** For the purpose of the program, you should check into the Garden Hotel no later than May 29, and check out no earlier than June 18, 2011. You should plan on arriving before dinner time on May 29, as there will be a welcoming banquet and a brief orientation program for participants on that evening. On the evening of June 17, there will be a farewell party when certificates of completion of the program will be presented to the participants.

Please note: If you enroll in the clinical program, you should plan to arrive no later than May 22, since the clinical program will begin on May 23. If you plan to register for the optional Chinese Language and Culture class for an additional ½ credit, you should arrive no later than May 26, since that class will begin on May 27.

9. **International Travel:** You are responsible for making your own travel arrangements to and from Beijing. The costs of a round-trip airfare to Beijing from the U.S. vary from airline to airline or travel agent to travel agent.
10. **Arrival Times:** *It is critical that you inform us of your arrival date, time and flight number in Beijing at your earliest convenience, so we know when to expect you in Beijing.* Professor Liu will arrive at the Garden Hotel in advance to receive all registered participants.

11. **Ground Transportation:** The most convenient transportation from the airport to the hotel is by taxi. The one way fare is approximately 100 RMB (\$15.00). We will provide you with written instructions in Chinese to show to the taxi driver to take you to the hotel. The new international terminal at the Beijing airport, built for the Olympic games, has prominent and easy-to-read signs to direct you to the taxi stand. We will also provide contact information for you to resolve any problems.
12. **Room:** The room is 175 RMB (approximately \$26.00) per day for double occupancy and 350 RMB (approximately \$51.00) per day for single occupancy. We will arrange a roommate for you largely based on the time of your arrival. If you arrive early and leave late, we cannot ensure that we can arrange a roommate for you before or after the duration of the program. **You should be prepared to pay for the single occupancy rate of \$51.00 per day for the extra days.** We will try to arrange a roommate for you based on your preference if we can. A Housing Preference Questionnaire will be sent to you after you have enrolled in the program.
13. **Board:** You may eat at local restaurants for approximately \$15.00 (RMB 102 Yuans) a day.
14. **Field Trips and Sightseeing Tours Included in the Tuition and Fees.** Field trips to the National People's Congress, Beijing's High Court, and law firms; sightseeing tours to the Great Wall, Ming Tombs, the new campus of China University of Political Science and Law.
15. **Optional Visit to Xian or Shanghai:** An optional sightseeing tour during the second weekend of the program to either Xian or Shanghai will be arranged.

Xian: a tour to the world famous archeological find, the Terra Cotta Warriors and Horses Museum may be arranged.

Shanghai: a tour to the world-famous Chinese financial center may be arranged. This tour would include major attractions in the city, e.g., The New Bund, the Bund Cruise Sightseeing Tour, the Oriental Pearl Radio and Television Tower, Shanghai Art Museum, Yu Garden, etc.

The costs are not included in the tuition and fees. The estimated costs will be approximately \$300.00 all inclusive.

16. **Currency Exchange:** The exchange rate between the Chinese currency RMB and the U.S. Dollar is approximately U.S.\$1.00 = RMB 6.83 Yuans. The Chinese currency is now available in the U.S. banks and at the international airports. Currency exchange is available in the Beijing International Airport. It is also available at the Garden Hotel. U.S. Traveler's checks are acceptable in China. Visa, Master Card and American Express are acceptable in major hotels and big department stores. **The Garden Hotel accepts cash and credit cards for payment.**
17. **Money for Gifts, Souvenirs or Other Needs:** Depending on your interest, \$500 is more than adequate.

19. Administrative Office and Contact in Beijing: The Administrative Office of the Program will be located in the Garden Hotel. Professor Frank Y. Liu, Associate Director, who speaks and writes fluent Mandarin Chinese, will stay at the hotel to handle all administrative matters and meet all of your needs.

20. Cancellation: The program may be canceled due to unexpected political, economic or natural disasters that may endanger the students. Under such circumstances, any deposits or unused tuition will be refunded to the registrants.

II. CLINICS/INTERNSHIPS

Clinics

To broaden the academic experience, students in the summer program are eligible for admission into a clinical program. The program is entirely voluntary and enables students to earn one (1) additional ABA-approved credit at nominal cost.

The clinical program provides students an opportunity to work in a legal clinic providing assistance to needy Chinese clients. Students can work in the intellectual property law or the labor law clinic.

In each clinic, the student will gain an in-depth knowledge of an important facet of Chinese law and participate in assisting clients with problems related to that field. The clients may include (i) young university student entrepreneurs seeking to protect an invention; (ii) workers from rural areas seeking to enforce wage and worker safety laws; and (iii) residents who fear development near their homes is endangering their health and the health of their families. The work is intellectually stimulating and fills a current void in a nation that has not yet developed a comprehensive system for dispensing legal assistance to the poor and under-represented.

All work is performed during the week before the start of the three-week class portion of the summer program and is entirely voluntary (i.e. no student is compelled to sign up for the clinical program). Students receive one (1) credit for the one-week program. The cost of the clinical program is \$150. The fee covers the cost of providing attorney supervision to the participants.

The Employment Legal Clinic is located in the CUPL downtown campus at 25 Xitucheng Rd, Beijing. The Intellectual Property Clinic is located at the Gao Bo Lung Hua Law Firm in the Chao Yang District.

Internships

Duquesne University has also arranged for two students (proficient in Mandarin) to intern in Chinese law firms. The internships are voluntary and commence at the end of the three-week summer program. The fee for an internship is \$150, and the student receives no compensation. Students receive ½ ABA-approved credit for each week of internship successfully completed, with a maximum of 1-½ credits. Internships are awarded on a first-come first-served basis.

Only Chinese Nationals are licensed to practice law in the P.R.C. Thus, all members of the law firms offering internships are Chinese citizens who have passed the National Lawyers Exam. However, because many clients the law firms represent are from the United States, Europe, Japan, Taiwan, and other Pacific Rim nations, many members of the firms have been admitted to Bars of other nations, including the Bars of the U.S.

states. The firms with whom we place students have lawyers who have been educated abroad as well as in the P.R.C.

We make an effort to place students in firms that perform the type of work in which the student has a particular interest. Thus, if a student is interested in intellectual property, we will endeavor to place the student with a firm that has expertise in Chinese patent and trademark law. However, we cannot guarantee that every student will be placed in a firm that performs a particular type of legal service. The experiences students have will vary with the firm's needs at the time the internship is performed. In the past, students have participated in meetings with clients; have assisted in drafting documents; have prepared correspondence; and have drafted legal memoranda.

In performing such tasks, the summer interns at times work closely with lawyers from one or more of the approximately 100 foreign law firms that have been authorized to establish offices in the P.R.C. but who are precluded from engaging in the practice of law within the P.R.C. because its members are not Chinese citizens. As of this date, Chinese lawyers are not permitted to associate with foreign law firms.

The summer clinics and internships offer students a unique opportunity to see first-hand how Chinese lawyers navigate the maize of often conflicting regulations promulgated at every level of Chinese government (national, provincial and local), and to see the importance of personal relationships in obtaining the requisite approvals.

The practice of law in the P.R.C. is as much about navigating the maize of often conflicting governmental regulations, and knowing where and how to obtain the required approvals, as it is about substantive rules. Exposure to P.R.C. lawyers skilled in obtaining the required approvals provides students with a unique opportunity to see the distinction between the written law and its application.

III. CHINA SUMMER STUDY OF LAW, BEIJING CHINA CODE OF CONDUCT

1. Code of Conduct for Course Work

A. Class Attendance

The Duquesne University School of Law policy relating to class attendance applies to the summer study of Chinese law program in Beijing. The policy states:

Regular attendance at all classes is mandatory. Any student whose attendance is not regular in any course will be ineligible to sit for the examination and will receive a failing grade.

Any absence from classes due to illness or other legitimate reasons must be reported to the Associate Director Professor Frank Y. Liu who is staying at the Garden Hotel with the students.

B. Punctuality

In order to show respect for the professor and fellow students, students must arrive at the class promptly at the scheduled time. Students failing to do so may be counted as absent.

C. Out of Town Trips

Students must not arrange out of town trips in conflict with the attendance policy stated above. For safety and security reasons, students must consult Professor Liu in advance if such a trip is contemplated. Once a trip is planned, the plan and the reliable contact information must be reported to Professor Liu.

D. Injury and Illness

Students should report any injury or illness to Professor Liu in order to seek prompt and proper medical treatment if necessary.

E. Other Actions and Emergencies

Any other actions or emergencies requiring the attention of the local police authority and/or the U.S. Embassy should also be promptly reported to Professor Liu for proper handling.

2. Code of Conduct for Internships and Clinical Program

- A. You should be assigned an English speaking “mentor” who will give you work assignments and be available to assist you. Make sure at the outset to identify your mentor and to ascertain how you can reach him/her when questions arise.
- B. Students are expected to dress appropriately, to be available during normal business hours, and to perform assigned tasks promptly and to the best of your ability. If you are not sure how an assigned task is to be performed, do not hesitate to discuss the matter with your mentor.
- C. You must provide Professor Peláez with the following documents:
 - a. Written verification, signed by a member of the P.R.C. firm, setting forth the beginning and ending dates of the internship and stating that the student has satisfactorily performed his/her assigned tasks;

It is recommended that you obtain the letter and send it to Professor Peláez directly rather than depend upon an employer to send it after you have departed. Mail the letter to him at the following address:

- b. A log prepared by the student setting forth the nature of the tasks he/she has performed; and
 - c. A candid and thorough evaluation of the intern experience, including whether we should continue to place interns with the firm and those facts upon which the evaluation is based.

Upon receipt of these documents, Professor Peláez will give the student the appropriate credit.

3. Drug and Alcohol Policy

The P.R.C. prohibits and severely punishes persons possessing or using proscribed substances and persons who are visibly intoxicated in public.

Under no circumstances will the possession or use of proscribed substances by participants in the Summer Program be tolerated. Duquesne University School of Law and China University of Political Science and Law reserve the right to dismiss any student who violates this policy.

While consumption of alcoholic beverages by adult Summer Program participants is not prohibited, moderation is mandated. Duquesne University School of Law and China University of Political Science and Law reserve the right to dismiss any student who consumes excessive quantities of alcoholic beverages or who appear in public while visibly intoxicated.

Dismissal for violation of this Drug and Alcohol Policy is at the sole discretion and judgment of Duquesne University School of Law and/or China University of Political Science and Law. Any student dismissed for violation of the Drug and Alcohol Policy will not receive a refund of tuition monies and will receive no credit for the Summer Program.

Each student, by his/her participation in the Summer Program, acknowledges that he/she is aware of and has assented to the terms of this Drug and Alcohol Policy.

IV. DIRECTORY OF FACULTY

Duquesne University Faculty

Alfred S. Peláez, Professor of Law, Director of the Program

Professor Peláez has been a member of the Law Faculty since graduating from the Yale Law School, where he was a Sterling Fellow. He currently teaches Contracts, Admiralty, Federal Courts and the Federal System, Sanctions, Sentencing and Corrections, and a Survey of Chinese Law.

Professor Peláez serves as a Distinguished Visiting Professor of Law at China University of Political Science and Law and is the Director of the joint Duquesne University--China University Summer Legal Study Program held annually in Beijing, P.R.C. The summer program attracts lawyers and law students from throughout the world.

Professor Peláez is a member of the bar of the Supreme Court of the United States, the United States Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit and the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania. He argues cases in the state and federal appellate courts, where the panel of judges frequently include former students.

Professor Peláez has served as Vice Chair of the Pennsylvania Commission on Sentencing, Reporter for the Speedy Trial Planning Group for the U.S. District Court for the Western District of Pennsylvania; and as International Consultant to The China Center for International Legal Study (Beijing, P.R.C.). He co-authored (with James Wm. Moore) Vol. 7A (Admiralty) of *Moore's Federal Practice* 2d ed. and annually authors the products liability materials for the Pennsylvania Bar Institute Civil Litigation Update.

Frank Y. Liu, Professor of Law, Associate Director of the Program

Professor Liu joined the faculty of the Duquesne University School of Law and served as the Director of the Center for Legal Information (the Law Library) in 1980. He earned a Bachelor of Law (LL.B.) at the top of his class from the National Taiwan University. He received a graduate fellowship from Yale Law School and studied there for one year. He received a Master of Comparative Jurisprudence (M.C.J.) and Master of Library Science (M.L.S.) from the University of Texas at Austin.

Professor Liu currently teaches Legal Research, Advanced Legal Research, and the Chinese legal history. He was instrumental in developing the faculty exchange program between Duquesne University School of Law and the China University of

Political Science and Law (CUPL) of Beijing, the People's Republic of China (PRC). With Professor Alfred S. Peláez, he helped to establish the Duquesne-CUPL summer study of Chinese law program in Beijing in 1995. He teaches in the program and serves as its Associate Director. Professor Liu is an Honorary Professor at CUPL and the Northern Jiaotong University, two of the most prestigious universities in China. In November, 2006, he was appointed by the President of AALS as one of the six American commissioners of the newly formed China-U.S. Joint Commission on Legal Education.

Professor Liu served as a Chair and/or member on numerous committees of the American Association of Law Libraries (AALL). In 1998, he was elected a member of the distinguished Executive Board of the AALL. Professor Liu served as the President of the Faculty Senate of Duquesne University from 1994-98. He was a member of the prestigious Pennsylvania Humanities Council. He has served in the leadership capacity of numerous other community organizations. He was a recipient of the Duquesne University President's Faculty Award for Excellence in Community Service.

Professor Liu is the co-author of a definitive and comprehensive legal research book on Pennsylvania law, titled, *Pennsylvania Legal Research Handbook*, 2001. He was a co-columnist on legal research for the widest circulating legal newspaper in Pennsylvania, *Pennsylvania Law Weekly*. He has published a total of 18 articles in the column.
