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ESSENTIAL NOTES

Times and time zones Times are United States Eastern time (Greenwich Mean Time, also known as Zulu time minus 4). Thus: 9.00 = 1 pm in the UK and 6 am in California.

Authors are to use their own discretion regarding how to structure their own time, including how much time within their time slot to leave for discussion. 10-15 minutes is recommended. For inexperienced presenters, note that time passes more quickly than you might imagine. Please keep an eye on the clock so that the moderator does not have to cut you off.

Zoom links are password protected to prevent “zoom bombing.” You do not need the password; the link I send you contains the password. Do not share it unless you are both registered participants in the conference.

A link has been created for each of the three zoom meeting rooms. You only need the links to the three rooms, and these links can be used for all four days. As a registered participant you can go into and out of any room at any time. You just need to leave the room and open the link to another room. During plenary sessions, which will all be in room 1, rooms 2 and 3 are likely to become idle and close due to inactivity. You can expect these rooms to be opened again by the host in time for the next presentation in that room.

If you have a loss of connection, you can go back in by simply clicking on the link. If the person who is host of that room for the day loses internet connection, the room will be shut down, and it should take only a few moments (hopefully) to sign back in, when the room is again open for all registered participants.

Once in zoom, remember to switch your microphones off. Use the “chat” option to type comments and questions, or use the raised hand button to draw attention. It is set up for verbal interaction. This is up to the discretion of the presenter with help from the session moderator.

HOSTS, MODERATORS AND PRESENTERS (Meeting room hosts below each day)

HOSTS: Keep your computer open on that zoom meeting room until the end of activities for the day. Use another device if you want to attend a presentation in another room.

PRESENTERS AND MODERATORS will be made cohosts at the start of each presentation. This is necessary for the presenter to be able to share his or her screen, and for the moderator to ensure the presenter is a cohost and to moderate the presentation. At the end of the presentation the moderator can take back the hosting privilege given to the presenter, then share cohosting with the next presenter. Hosts for the day, please keep an eye on these transfers before each presentation so you can help if needed.

MODERATORS: We suggest that every moderator briefly introduces the speakers and the presentations. This can simply mean mentioning the name of the speaker, affiliation, and the title of the presentation before they start to speak. Until the conference is running smoothly, we advise you to indicate to speakers and audience some basic rules. These include the way you will provide time keeping to the speaker and the way the audience can ask questions. For time keeping, we suggest you to simply turn your mic on after 30 mins have past. Tell this to each speaker before they start, so they can time themselves, too. You can then intervene again when only 5 mins are left. As a general rule, it seems wise to allow at least 10 mins for questions, so at about 30 mins into the presentation the speaker should open the floor to some questions, if they haven't already done so. To ensure questions run smoothly, you can ask the audience to use the "raise your hand" function accessible on Zoom. You can then help the speaker to call all individuals who raised their hand in turn. It won't ensure that a specific order is respected, but it should guarantee that turns are taken without too many people starting to talk at the same time. Another option if for the presenter to summarize a number of similar questions in the chat room and ask them. Please stop participants from giving speeches; you can remind them to please ask their questions.
