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OFFICE OF RESIDENCE LIFE

The Office of Residence Life is committed to creating an environment in each of the seven Living Learning Centers in which students may grow and develop as a total person. Its philosophy and programs are based on the belief that the Living Learning Center experience is an important part of the total University education. The purpose of the Office of Residence Life is to facilitate the personal and academic growth of the resident students. The professional and resident assistant staff will provide the means to foster such development.

All freshmen and sophomore students, except those residing with their parents, are required to live in one of Duquesne's Living Learning Centers. All students living on campus are further required to take a University meal plan. Housing Agreement terms are effective for the entire academic year, with room and board rates being determined on an annual basis.

APPLYING FOR HOUSING

As a new Duquesne student, please visit duq.edu/new-students to review items such as Housing Information, the Campus Residency Policy, Health Immunization verification, and Student Health Insurance in addition to other important information to consider before you arrive to campus for your first semester.

After you have completed your Housing Agreement, you will receive information on how to log into My College Roomie (MCR) and will be able to set up your profile. This will give you the opportunity to get to know other incoming students and identify a roommate for next year. If you do not self-select a roommate, we will pair you with a roommate based on your profile results.

DINING OPTIONS

Duquesne Dining Services offers 11 convenient dining locations across campus, include three national brands (Starbucks, Freshens and Chick-Fil-A), one residential dining facility (Hogan Dining Center), one full-service restaurant (Red Ring Bar & Grille) and seven retail locations. Guest will enjoy fresh, made-from-scratch food and menus that focus on seasonal items and provide continuous selections that change throughout the day. Select from a wide variety of delicious and healthy meals, featuring local and sustainable food sources, build-your-own meal concepts and special options for every diet, including vegan, vegetarian and gluten-free. Every day you'll walk in into the sight of fresh salads, mouthwatering deli sandwiches, fresh dough pizzas, hand-cut fries, home-cooked favorites, and so much more! Students living on campus are required to enroll in a meal plan.

FRESHMEN HOUSING OPTIONS

The following housing options are available for freshmen students: Assumption Hall, St. Ann Hall, St. Martin Hall, and the Duquesne Towers. Freshmen housing is primarily offered as double rooms, however there are limited options for freshmen to select single, triple, or quad rooms. All Living Learning Centers come equipped with cable, wireless internet, and laundry accommodations for student's convenience.

ASSUMPTION HALL – Assumption Hall, is home of the Honors College and houses approximately 250 students ranging from freshmen to seniors. Residence Life staff within in Assumption Hall work closely with the Honors College staff to integrate student learning inside and outside of the classroom.

ST. ANN HALL – St. Ann Hall houses approximately 550 freshmen students and is home to many of the university's Living Learning Communities through the McAnulty College of Liberal Arts. Divided into two wings connected by the lobby and recreation room, St. Ann provides freshmen students a fantastic opportunity to build community and learn.

ST. MARTIN HALL – St. Martin Hall is home to approximately 500 freshmen students, and also serves as home to several Learning Communities for students enrolled in the McAnulty College of Liberal Arts. St. Martin offers rooms with fantastic views of Pittsburgh's historic South Side, the Monongahela River and Pittsburgh's downtown area.

THE DUQUESNE TOWERS – The Duquesne Towers is home to approximately 1100 students. Divided into three wings (A, B, & C), the Duquesne Towers provides residents with spacious lounges and kitchenettes for studying and programming. Freshmen space in the Duquesne Towers is limited. Located in the Duquesne Towers is the Rev. Sean Hogan Dining Center, Spiritan Campus Ministry, Student Mail Center, and Campus Market.

RESIDENT DIRECTORS

The Resident Director and Assistant Resident Director (RD/ARD) are full-time, highly trained, live-in Residence Life staff members whose primary role is to support the academic and personal growth of all residential students. RDs and ARDs enforce university policies and follow-up with students regarding health and behavioral concerns.

Resident Directors and Assistant Resident Directors supervise Resident Assistants and assist them in facilitating individual and building wide programs.

RESIDENT ASSISTANTS

The Resident Assistant (RA) is an upper-class student who lives on each floor to help students with day-to-day concerns. Resident Assistants are selected on the basis of leadership, scholarship and experience with a knowledge, awareness and commitment to Duquesne University's values, especially as set forth in the University Mission Statement.

Resident Assistants serve as role models, community builders, educators and peer counselors in addition to helping provide a safe and secure living environment for resident students.
